

The Bell Tower, Home of the Swan Bells

Entry Conditions.

Things you should know to plan your visit:

An adult must accompany children under 12 years.

Accessible facilities available.

Visit length is approximately 20-30 minutes.

For safety reasons, a maximum of 100 people are permitted in the tower at any one time.

Flat, closed shoes must be worn for access to the observation deck.

Prams, large bags, backpacks and bulky items are not permitted in the tower.

Smoking is not permitted in the tower or observation deck of the tower.

Concession Entitlements:

Children 5-14

Australian Government senior cardholders

Centrelink cardholders

Full time student cardholders

Companion Card for Disability Carers.

A valid concession card must be produced to gain concession entry.

Children under the age of 5 years are permitted free of charge.

A Family Discount is available.

Special Needs Visitors

The Disability Services Commission and the City of Perth provided input during the design phase of the building to ensure maximum accessibility for people with special needs.

From the very beginning of the design of the building, the requirements of disabled visitors were given the highest priority. The building provides for wheelchair and stroller access, a lift that accesses all levels, a large format disabled/special needs toilet (which provides a seated area, sink and shower facilities for guests with special needs, including parents with babies or young children. The lift is also fitted with a duplicate set of control buttons to allow for larger wheelchairs that are unable to turn in a lift.

Barrack Square provides ramped entry and tactile tiles for blind visitors to mark the edge of the water features and pedestrian crossings. The Bell Tower is also a participant in the Companion Card – a National Disability Services WA initiative to enable disabled members of the community to be accompanied by their carer free of charge.
